2018! How was it for you?

My 2018 was a bit like the Parson's Egg; good in parts.

It started off hopefully with me going, at the beginning of January, to the Joint School at Mount Vernon Hospital. Disappointingly this was not anything to do with illegal substances (on the NHS?) but was to inform patients about the surgery they would be having shortly. I was due to have a hip replacement on 21st February and was surrounded by others in a similar situation. Afterwards I went off to have an MRSA test, which everyone now has before surgery to ensure the infection is not spread. I was reminded to have another test 3 weeks before admission, which I duly did. Somehow in the interim I managed to contract MRSA! After a great deal of circular discussion the decision was taken to postpone the surgery until 21st March to give time for the MRSA to be killed off. I had to take daily showers with the most disgusting, smelly, skin drying, pink disinfectant (Chanel it was not).

On 21st March I duly turned up at Trinity Ward at Mount Vernon at 7.00am, was given a single room to keep me separate from lesser mortals, just in case I spread any MRSA bugs. When the surgeon called in to see me he was unsure as to whether the surgery would be happening as he had not received the all-clear from Infection Control. Long gone are the days when surgeons could issue their orders and expect to be obeyed! Happily the all-clear was given and the surgery went ahead. The surgery was undertaken with local anaesthetic and sedatives. A heroine I am not, so I did say that they could fill me up with as much of either, or both, as they liked!

I went home after four days and began to make a good recovery, having physio, which I dutifully did on a daily basis. I found I was eating considerably less than previously and began to lose weight; not a bad thing on my case, I felt. I might even get into that bikini in the summer, although maybe not; I wouldn't want to scare everyone on the beach!!

After a while I thought I must have a urine infection, although this was a guess, and took myself off to our doctor to get, as I thought, some antibiotics. This self-diagnosis was regarded, justifiably, with great suspicion, particularly bearing in mind the weight loss. Before I knew it I was at Hillingdon Hospital having numerous tests and scans: MRI, Ultrasound, ERCP to name just a few. Several parts of this sacred vessel - my body - were under scrutiny. On a Tuesday I had an appointment at MV to see the surgeon who had done the hip replacement and was given the all-clear; just to contact him if I had any problems. **Hip! Hip!** Hooray! I thought, a little normality back into my life.

The very next day, the Wednesday, I had a phone call from Hillingdon Hospital asking me to come in the following day to talk about the results of the tests. No time to even take a deep breath. It was cancer. I was immediately referred to the Liver, Biliary & Pancreatic Department at Hammersmith Hospital. I had Ampullary Adenocarcinoma cancer at the end of my bile duct where it joins the duodenum. On several occasions I met the surgeon who would be operating on me, and what great confidence he inspired, this highly skilled, approachable human being. Small cancer, big surgery, he said. Several Health Care Professionals told me that if they were having the same surgery they would want him to do it and as a bonus about six of these operations were done weekly, so plenty of practice before they got to me.

I went into Hammersmith Hospital on 15th October, again early in the morning, somewhat hindered by the fact that Hanger Lane Underpass was flooded because of heavy rain during the night. We managed to sail down the A40 to Hammersmith Hospital where once again I had a single room because of the MRSA, for which I had had more tests in the lead up to the surgery, plus of course more shampooing and showering in stinky pink disinfectant. I remember having put the gown on for the surgery, stepping into the lift and then.....waking up in the High Dependency Unit with my two daughters gazing at this person with tubes protruding from just about every orifice.
